# Dear Friends,

With another year behind us at Samaritan Community, I cannot help but reflect not only on the critical services we provided more than 6,660 times to some of Baltimore's most vulnerable populations, but the manner in which we provided them. Every person who comes to Samaritan Community is supported, valued, and treated with dignity.

We combine the practical benefits of our food pantry, clothing shop, case management services, computer workroom, emergency financial assistance, individual counseling, group support, and life enrichment activities with the power of community and strong emotional support. This dual approach gives members a strong foundation of support that empowers and encourages them to make tough changes, take calculated



chances, and put in the hard work needed to succeed. And ultimately, it's what helps our members to build more stable lives for themselves and their families.

Greater stability. That's our ultimate goal for all of our members. Because we do not serve any specific population or address any one area-of-need specifically, people often come to us as a last hope and with a wide-range of needs. Some members may only need groceries for a few weeks during a temporary setback. Others are looking to rebuild their lives and need most, if not all, of our services for an extended period of time. While others are isolated and need a place to which they can belong.

In 2019, we worked more than ever before on understanding our impact on stability. We launched a first-ever survey asking members of their experiences at Samaritan and the impact we've had on their lives. While we continue to conduct these surveys on an ongoing basis, we have been humbled by the results so far. Approximately 63% of respondents report their situations are more stable than before coming to Samaritan, many of whom credit the combination of service and support as what truly helped them.

As time moves forward, we will remain steadfast in our focus of service and support, with the goal of helping members have more stable lives, no matter the tremendous challenges they face. Thank you for being a part of it.

In 2019, we were able to make several significant enhancements to our already-comprehensive "Crisis Intervention Assistance & Empowerment" Programs, which encompass our core services.

# Meet Ernestine Brown, Our New Assistant Program Director

We were thrilled that Ms. Brown joined us in April 2019 as our new, part-time Assistant Program Director. With decades of experience in the human services field, Ernestine was an ideal fit. In her role at Samaritan, she works closely with clients particularly with our case management services and client intake interviews. She's also there to help Sharon, Program Director, in helping run our organization.

"It's delightful to have Ernestine on the team. With her experience and dedication, she adds a great deal to Samaritan," says Sharon.

The feeling is mutual with Ernestine being deeply moved by how grateful people are for the kindness and respect found at Samaritan.

"I am struck by how the work here is really about building relationships that foster real progress, not about meeting numeric goals," says Ernestine. "This makes the work much more rewarding and the human touch we give here, is so much more powerful than most people realize. That touch is exactly what is missing in the lives of so many of those we are helping."

# **New Member Survey**

We are proud of our approach of providing critical services like our food pantry and case management coupled with strong emotional support is an effective way to help people gain greater stability. But up until this year, we relied solely on members' testimonials and our daily interactions with them to confirm it. That's why in summer 2019, we launched our first-ever, follow-up survey for members. Members of our programming staff called and spoke with former and current members about their experiences at Samaritan Community.

The largest take-aways from the survey is that 68% of surveyed members said they received services, in addition to the one(s) for which they initially came to Samaritan and 63% of surveyed members said their situation is more stable than before coming to Samaritan.



# **SAMARITAN'S EIGHT CORE SERVICES:**

# **Combining Critical Services & Strong Emotional Support**

Samaritan provides critical, basic-needs services through our Crisis Intervention Assistance services that include our food pantry, clothing "shop", case management, computer workroom, and emergency financial assistance. Most members initially come to Samaritan for these services, but often stay to benefit from our Empowerment services. These services help identify the often-complex reasons for the initial crisis and provide members with strong emotional support from others and help them be recognized as valued members of a community. Our Empowerment Program includes our individual counseling, group support, and life enrichment groups. In 2019, roughly 320 unduplicated households, of which 133 were new, came to

Samaritan for help. We estimate that roughly 1,050 men, women, and children were impacted

by our services.

# **Crisis Intervention Assistance Food Pantry**

Our food pantry is our most-utilized service and is typically the initial way people come to us. In 2019, our food pantry saw 1,915 visits and distributed roughly 8,835 bags of groceries – full of healthy produce, breads, dairy, seafood, and shelf items – all donated from Whole Foods Market. Mt. Washington. Bags are given mainly through pantry visits but also through deliveries of surplus to other social service organizations. Our pantry is open several days a week and evenings by appointment, to better accommodate members who work during the day. We also purchase additional food from Maryland Food Bank and toiletries (i.e. toothpaste, deodorant, soap, etc.) from other suppliers.

## **Clothing Shop**

Our clothing shop is where members can get gently-used clothing and household items for themselves and their families, free-of-charge. The clothing shop has provided clothes for job interviews, kids clothes for school, better-fitting items for people going through or recovering from a tough illness, and more. It's also where members and volunteers come together to talk, laugh, and support one another. In 2019, about 253 unduplicated individuals came to the shop roughly 1,385 times.

# **Case Management**

Samaritan programming staff work to help clients through many types of difficult and often-complicated situations. Our case management services include (but not limited to): helping clients obtain/retain housing, employment, medical care, and more. Our staff provided roughly 540 case management sessions for about 150 unduplicated clients in 2019.



# **Computer Workroom**

Here, members search for employment and educational opportunities, complete paperwork for social services, register for training programs, and more. This room is also used for some of our life enrichment groups and is a place where members build support networks.

# **Emergency Financial Assistance**

For many of our members, one minor setback can start a domino effect with the potential to create life-altering traumas. For others, they may need additional financial help after a job loss, medical crisis, or many other reasons. In these situations, we use emergency financial stipends in helping members re-establish themselves. In 2019, we distributed nearly \$33,000 in small stipends.



In addition to our regular emergency financial assistance, we also distributed \$8,910 from our Farnham-Krieger Endowment Fund. Members who received help from The Fund were facing multiple, complex challenges such as help with job training, housing, and more which required greater investment.


# **EMPOWERMENT SERVICES**

# **Individual Empowerment Counseling**

Most members come to us for our crisis intervention assistance services. Our individual empowerment counseling is one way that helps us and our clients understand and address the reasons behind the immediate need. People who are struggling with acute and long-term problems receive support tailored to their specific needs and circumstances. While most are by appointment and are held within Samaritan, they also include phone calls and Skype sessions. In 2019, our staff worked with roughly 136 unduplicated members across an estimated 1,120 individual counseling sessions.

# **Group Support & Life Enrichment**

Emotional support and being part of a community is a major theme across all services. We strongly believe having social bonds and support is crucial in improving one's life. No service encompasses this more than our weekly "Breakfast Club," during which members, volunteers, staff, and board members come together to prepare and enjoy a meal together. Lively conversations about personal matters and those affecting society are discussed. Formal support group is held afterward.



In 2019, there were roughly 1,440 visits to "Breakfast" and/or our life enrichment groups.

# LIKE MANY, KEVIN FIRST CAME FOR HELP WITH GROCERIES - BUT SOON DISCOVERED MUCH MORE



Kevin now has a good-paying job with real growth potential.

Kevin came to the Samaritan Community in late-July for an emergency supply of food. Having worked all of his adult life, he was now unemployed and out of savings. With hopelessness on the horizon, Kevin came to us for food and was surprised to discover much more. And he's not alone. During a recent survey of our members, 68% of respondents said they received additional services on top of the one(s) for which they initially came to Samaritan.

Dave, our Assistant to the Director, who works closely with Sharon, Program Director, put Kevin at ease. He assured him that

Samaritan would be a steady support until Kevin found employment. Dave provided Kevin with food, clothing, and a bus pass to help him in his job search. Soon after, Kevin landed a good-paying job and his manager is eager for him to advance.

"I can't believe how much Dave and Sharon genuinely cared about me and how willing they were to help," says Kevin. "They had faith in me when I most needed someone to believe in me."

Today, Kevin is more confident and relaxed than he was when he first came to us, and is eager to start volunteering at Samaritan in his time off.

# Inspired to Help, She Started "Knitting Club"

Marva first came to Samaritan when a friend suggested our services, particularly our long-standing "Breakfast Club", a weekly event during which we prepare and enjoy a meal together.

After that, Marva was hooked. Soon after that day, she became a "Breakfast" regular and a valued member of our community. She was also finding that being a member of a tight-knit community, like Samaritan, was making her happier and enriching her life a great deal.

"I met many new friends and was moved by how everyone at Samaritan supports each other," she recalls.

She then took the initiative and approached our Program Director, Sharon, about starting a new group that could help others just as "Breakfast" helped her. Marva soon created and now leads "The Knitting Club", which teaches loom knitting.

"I really was inspired by the looming class because it taught me a new experience and it's so much fun and relaxing," says TC, a "Knitting Club" member. "And, I love my Samaritan family.
